# **Important City Council Meeting**

On Tuesday night, June 14, 2016 at 7:00pm, Sunnyvale's City Council will vote to approve building a 1.65 million square-foot office complex, north of SNAIL, near Mathilda Ave. and Highway 237. It will include five more 129-foot-tall office buildings, 4 and 5 story concrete parking structures and 5,340 parking spaces.

Many of the more than 5,000 expected vehicle trips per day will pour down Mathilda and Fair Oaks Ave. Many of the more than 9,000 expected computer company workers will compete for housing in north Sunnyvale, significantly increasing rents at local apartments.

#### **Brief Summary of May General Meeting Minutes**

Summer School Program Book Drive: Georgina Aubin is collecting books for the Summer School Program.

**Peery Park Environmental Impact Report:** John Cordes reported the draft of the report will be discussed June 13<sup>th</sup>. Six projects have been approved for Peery Park. San Aleso, on our side of Mathilda, is also part of Peery Park.

**Social Secretary Report:** Bonnie is putting out a call for volunteers to host a monthly dinner night out. Bonnie will take reservations and make a reservation at the restaurant as well.

**Special Election:** The special election to replace Dave Whittum will be on August 16<sup>th</sup>. May 20<sup>th</sup> is the last date that a candidate may enter. So far, John Cordes and Larry Klein are running for this office. Whoever does not win this election will be in the November election.

**Candidate Forum:** Connie stated that participating with another association would be best so that no candidate preferences are shown. Since the election is on November 8<sup>th</sup>, perhaps the forum should be held 28 days before the absentee ballots are sent out. Jim believes a weekend would be better for working people. Councilmember Jim Griffith stated that weekends during the day are the least favorite for candidates, but they will attend regardless. Sunday evening was also suggested. A vote was taken to determine whether the forum should include City Council candidates and School Board candidates or just City Council candidates; eight for City Council candidates only.

Full Day Drop-In Recreation Program, Dog House:** Open daily, Monday–Friday, June 13<sup>th</sup> through August 5<sup>th</sup> at Columbia Neighborhood Center (CNC), 785 Morse Ave. The Dog House summer camp will feature group activities, arts and crafts, outdoor sports, swimming and more! Participants ages 6–13 have three options to drop-in: all day (8:30am – 5:30pm, morning only (8:30am – 12:30pm), or afternoon only (1:30 – 5:30pm). This camp has a reduced fee option that requires families to be preapproved. Pre-approval is based on household income. Applications are available at Columbia Neighborhood Center and Sunnyvale Community Center and are accepted through July 25<sup>th</sup>. Families who are not approved for the reduced price will pay the daily regular price. #### **Flag Day History**

National Flag Day is when Americans celebrate the meaning of their nation's flag, honor the traditions associated with its care, and educate those around them to its significance. The Flag of the United States is to be honored and carries with it both history and tradition. On June 14, 1777 the Flag Resolution was signed, making the current stars and stripes the National Flag of the United States of America. On May 30, 1916, President Woodrow Wilson called for the nationwide observance of Flag Day. In 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed congress' decree, making June 14<sup>th</sup> of each year National Flag Day.

#### **Facts about Flag Day**

- On August 3, 1949, President Harry S. Truman signed a congressional order making June 14<sup>th</sup> of each year National Flag Day.
- Worn out flags may be given to the American Legion or Boy/Girl Scouts of America where they will burn the flags in a formal ceremony on June 14<sup>th</sup>.
- The Flag should never touch the ground when being taken down. It should be folded neatly and stored ceremoniously.
- You should fly the American Flag only between sunrise and sunset. If left hanging around the clock, it must be illuminated during the dark hours.
- The First Flag Act was signed by the Continental Congress on June 14, 1777... "Resolved, that the flag of the United States be made of thirteen stripes, alternate red and white; that the union be thirteen stars, white in a blue field, representing a new Constellation."

## Neighborhood Preservation

**16.08.030.** Hours of construction-Time and noise limitations. Construction activity shall be permitted between the hours of 7am and 6pm daily Monday through Friday. Saturday hours of operation shall be between 8am and 5pm. There shall be no construction activity on Sunday or federal holidays when city offices are closed. No loud environmentally disruptive noises, such as air compressors without mufflers, continuously running motors or generators, loud playing musical instruments, radios, etc., will be allowed where such noises may be a nuisance to adjacent residential neighborhoods.

Exceptions:

(a) Construction activity is permitted for detached single-family residential properties when the work is being performed by the owner of the property, provided no construction activity is conducted prior to 7am or after 7pm Monday through Friday, prior to 8am or after 7pm on Saturday and prior to 9am or after 6pm on Sunday and national holidays when city offices are closed. It is permissible for up to two persons to assist the owner of the property so long as they are not hired by the owner to perform the work. For purposes of this section, "detached single-family residential property" refers only to housing that stands completely alone with no adjoining roof, foundation or sides.

(b) As determined by the chief building official:

(1) No loud environmentally disruptive noises, such as air compressors without mufflers, continuously running motors or generators, loud playing musical instruments, radios, etc., will be allowed where such noises may be a nuisance to adjacent properties.

(2) Where emergency conditions exist, construction activity may be permitted at any hour or day of the week. Such emergencies shall be completed as rapidly as possible to prevent any disruption to other properties.

(3) Where additional construction activity will not be a nuisance to surrounding properties, based on location and type of construction, a waiver may be granted to allow hours of construction other than as stated in this section.
