MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR



We were fortunate to start the year with Otto Lee on the very important topic of "Why should we care about district maps?"

Although a candidate for District 3 seat on

the SCC Board of Supervisor, Otto Lee, former mayor, vice mayor and city council member from 2003 to 2011, addressed SNAIL members in a non-political and nonpartisan manner on the importance of understanding the impact district mapping can have on residents.

With numbers in hand, Otto shared with us the newly citizendrawn and Council-voted City district (map 120D) and presented the County district maps clearly showing, (what many SNAIL members did not know) the City of Sunnyvale being split into two districts; D3 covering North Sunnyvale, Milpitas, East Unincorporated Hills, all the way to Evergreen in East San Jose; and D5 covering South Sunnyvale, Cupertino, Mountain View, Palo Alto, Los Altos and Los Altos Hills.

His presentation gave us a strong foundation to understanding the importance of district mapping.

Continuing the theme of elections, there are two important articles in this newsletter issue:

- Changes in the SCC on how to vote in the March 3rd election, and
- 2. Our February guest speaker: Elaine Manley from the League of Women Voters (and moderator of the past SNAIL Candidate forum), to address SNAIL members and present the ballot measures on the March 3rd ballot.

GETTING READY FOR THE UPCOMING MARCH 3RD ELECTIONS



Santa Clara County Registrar of Voters is modernizing voting and providing voters with greater flexibility and convenience.

What's changing?

Starting with the March 3, 2020 Presidential Primary Election:

1. Every registered voter will receive a Vote by Mail ballot starting 29 days before Election Day.

- 2. Voters can vote at any of the Vote Centers in Santa Clara County.
- 3. Approximately 22 Vote Centers will open for 11 days including Election Day and approximately 88 Vote Centers will be open for four days including Election Day for a total of 110 Vote Centers throughout the County on Election Day.
- 4. Vote Centers will offer more space, additional services and new enhanced voting equipment.

VOTERS will have more options and will get to choose WHEN, WHERE, and HOW to vote!

So, what are the options?

USE YOUR VOTE BY MAIL BALLOT

- Mail your ballot in a postage-paid return envelope
- Place your ballot in an Official Ballot Drop Box
- ✓ Return your ballot to any Vote Center

OR

GET A BALLOT AT A VOTE CENTER

When: Vote any day during election week (Feb. 22 – Mar. 3, 2020). Where: Visit any of the Vote Centers located throughout the County. How: Vote a paper ballot or on a new voting machine.

SUPER BOWL HISTORY

The Super Bowl is the season final championship game of the National Football League (NFL) in the USA. The matchup for this game is the winning teams of the National Football Conference (NFC) and the American Football Conference (AFC). Super Bowl 1 was held in February of 1967. The Super Bowl is one of the most watched television events in the United States. According Nielsen Media Research, it had over 114.4 million viewers in 2015, the most ever. It is held on the first Sunday in February.

SUPER BOWL FACTS

- Super Bowl LIV (54) will be played in Miami at the Hard Rock Stadium. It will be broadcast on FOX.
- In 2019, the cost of a 30 second commercial during the Super Bowl was \$5.2 million dollars.
- Super Bowl Sunday is the second biggest eating day of the year after Thanksgiving. A total of 1.38 million chicken wings were eaten during 2019's Super Bowl weekend.
- The winner receives the Vince Lombardi Trophy. Vince Lombardi was the coach for the Green Bay Packers who won the first two Super Bowls back-to-back.
- The record for the most points scored by a single team during a Super Bowl is held by the San Francisco 49ers. The San Francisco 49ers scored a total of 55 points against the Denver Broncos in the Super Bowl XXIV (24).

SUPER BOWL TOP EVENTS AND THINGS TO DO

- ✓ Attend the Super Bowl. According to Vivid Seats, the average per ticket is \$11,179 with the most expensive ticket being a whopping \$485,750!
- ✓ Host a Super Bowl party with friends and family.
- ✓ Organize or purchase boxes in a football pool. A football pool is a table that contains all the score combinations based on the last digit of each team's score. The score numbers are drawn at random after all boxes are assigned. Because of this, the odds of winning are the same regardless of each participant's knowledge of the game.
- ✓ Watch the Super Bowl commercials. Commercials for the big game are the most expensive on TV and, for many, more entertaining than the game.
- ✓ Make guacamole. This is the quintessential (and healthy!) super bowl dip.
