Full-Time Bicycle Lanes Coming to Maude Ave.

Sunnyvale is taking bids for the project to add full-time dedicated bicycle lanes and some pedestrian improvements on Maude Ave. from Borregas Ave. to Fair Oaks Ave. These changes will make Maude Ave. safer and more pleasant for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers by improving visibility and it will create a dedicated space for the cyclists and others. The new bicycle lanes will replace all the on-street parking along in this portion of Maude. The bid number is *IFB-PW18-06-0-2018/LV* and the budget estimate is \$1,135,000. Brief Summary of April General Meeting Minutes

SNAIL Business: The homeless shelter will now be open all year. After the year a report will be done on the effectiveness of this. Home First, the agency in charge of the shelter, is much more organized this year. Those wishing to volunteer must have a TB test.

Vice Mayor Larry Klein attended the meeting. Valerie asked him when the proposed Summit High School on San Aleso will go before the Planning Commission. A representative of this school offered to speak at a SNAIL meeting, but we want to know more about this project first. This charter school serving 500 students would be on the site of the former ceramic building. A previous proposed site was a former industrial building which was deemed unacceptable.

The Vice Mayor mentioned that Vision Zero Sunnyvale is trying to eliminate bicycle fatalities. There is an online survey we are invited to take to help with this endeavor. Barry has been waiting ten years for a blinking traffic crosswalk at Borregas and Eaglewood. He would rather have a four-way stop instead. Larry suggested he write a letter to the City Council.

Candidate Forum: Candidate Forum will be Thursday, September 13th in the Fair Oaks Park Building. Valerie was able to get the building rent free. The Lowlanders, Hazelheads, San Miguel and Plaza Del Rey neighborhood associations are interested in participating. Linda Davis from the League of Women Voters will assist us with organizing the event. Also, the League of Women Voters may record the event and provide us with a moderator as well. June may pick up the key to the building. We need to confirm how many candidates will be participating. Also, we need snacks without crumbs and to borrow a California flag.

LIVING A LOW CARBON LIFE



Like many of our neighbors, we have been trying to minimize our impact on our environment while maximizing the joy we get out of living on this planet and in SNAIL. It might seem hard to shrink your carbon footprint, but there are many resources out there to support all of us as we make changes. Here are just a few of our personal favorites we've encountered in our journey:

- www.CoolCalifornia.org Lots of resources, including an easy personal carbon footprint calculator. Knowing your footprint allows you to focus on the changes that will have the most impact for you.
- <u>www.Terracycle.com</u> Offers a range of free programs that are funded by companies, as well as recycling solutions available for purchase for almost every form of waste.
- Freecycle Network (www.freecycle.org) A grassroots and entirely nonprofit movement of people who are giving (and getting) stuff for free in their own towns and keeping good stuff out of landfills. Today it has 5,000+ groups with over 9 million members across the globe.
- The Story of Stuff videos (<u>www.storyofstuff.org</u>) These engaging, short videos help people understand how things get made, used and disposed, and the impact of those processes on our planet.
- Three Numbers that Matter by Bill McKibben Do a quick internet search and many articles will pop up, but try to watch his video. It was an eye-opener for us and fueled us with urgency. (Teaser: 2° Celsius, 565 Gigatons, 2,795 Gigatons.)
- Stanford's evening class "Climate Change: What You Can Do to Live a Low-Carbon Life" We attended this 3-session class together in February and it has jumpstarted our progress. It introduces participants to skills such as how to "green" transportation at their own pace, save energy at home, recycle better, green finances, make dietary changes, impact policy, and more. Their next class starts on May 23rd. For more details, contact healthimprovement @ stanford .edu.

And here are a few tweaks to our routine that were easy to adopt. Hopefully, they inspire some of your own ideas.

- Leaving food containers in our cars and bike bags so that we can use them for leftovers when we eat out.
- Keeping a clean spoon and fork in our bags, so we don't have to take plastic ones at eateries.
- Frequenting merchants who allow us to bring our own containers. (There are many in Sunnyvale!)
- **♣** Buying in bulk, concentrated form whenever possible.
- ♣ Refusing random freebies, e.g., pens, fidget spinners, etc. that we know will get tossed out eventually.
- Using newspaper, instead of plastic bags, to pick up after the dog. (Actually, we got this idea from a neighbor.)

Summit Denali Public School Project

Summit Denali applied for a "use permit to construct" their new 400 student Charter high school campus at 824 San Aleso Ave. Plans are currently being reviewed and available at the city planning department. Some concerns about this project are:

- It is right against the backyard of some of the folks on Madrone and West Hemlock,
- > It calls for wrap-around parking against property line on the East side of the property,
- > They plan to build a 3-level mechanical parking structure at the NE corner of the back of the property against the apartment complex and the single-family homes on the SNAIL side,
- ➤ Even with this 3-level mechanical parking structure, they would still be short 12 parking spaces from the required parking for their requested occupancy.


New DPS Initiative: "Walk with the Chief"


