HIGHLIGHTS OF LAST MONTH'S SNAIL GENERAL MEETING

Guest Speaker (John Cordes, Sunnyvale ATP Committee Member): Sunnyvale is creating its first Active Transportation Plan (ATP) by combining updates to its Bicycle Master Plan, Pedestrian Safety Plan and Safe Routes to School Plan. This is a once in a decade effort to make our streets safer for children walking to school, pedestrians, and bicycling.

Among efforts to achieve these updates were 21 focus groups walking around 21 schools, checking for safety, ease of walking, stressful areas, and obstacles. These groups created 21 maps for best routes to school. An online survey was offered through October 16th for the general public to pinpoint areas of concern. Walking and biking tours took place also noting safety, obstacles and stress. Other considerations were priority destinations and barriers encountered. A finding was El Camino is the most dangerous for bikers and walkers. Also, it was decided new buildings must include sidewalks.

City Council Updates (Gustav Larsson, Councilmember): Fifteen percent of the new apartments in Sunnyvale will be rented at low market rate. These must remain so for 55 years. \$45,000 to \$65,000 income per year is considered low income.

There is a new animal code for pets. Each household is allowed four large animals, such as cats or dogs. For small animals, such as chickens, six are allowed.

The 'Unity' district map was voted in unanimously with no discussion. At the November 5th Council meeting they will review and narrow-down the maps from 7 to 3. At the Tuesday, November 12th Council Meeting there will be a council decision on a map. Also discussed will be how the mayor will be elected and how long the terms will be. HOW SWEET IT IS!



Thanksgiving is great for so many reasons, and one of those reasons is the delicious sweets that become available to us! But before reaching for those sweets, do you know how to calculate grams of sugar into sugar packet equivalents?

On a nutrition-facts label, look at grams of sugar for the portion that you plan to consume. Take the total grams and divide by 4. This number is the equivalent of sugar packets to help you visualize the amount of sugar. Total recommendations for women are 6 packets of sugar total, and for men, 9 packets total per day. There is 25g of sugar in a standard pumpkin pie slice, which is around 6.25 sugar packets, or a little over the total daily recommendation for women of sugar in a day. So when reaching for those sweets, consider a smaller slice, and choose to have smaller samples of things over larger portions in order to help keep your sugar consumption down during thanksgiving season.

SPEAKERS' CORNER: HERITAGE PARK MUSEUM

I will first introduce the Sunnyvale Historical Society and the beautiful museum we have, with the last 10 acres of apricots in Santa Clara County behind it. Then I will go into some details about the Stephens Townsend Murphy party. Stevens Creek is named for Elijah Stephens (they changed the spelling) and Murphy Avenue is named for Martin Murphy Jr. Their epic trip was in 1844 (two years ahead of the Donner Party) and resulted in the first wagons to cross the Sierra and the first European child to be born in CA. It is a great story. Then we will talk about the Murphy house which stood for 100 years in Sunnyvale. We have the original candelabras, clock and piano from this house. I will share with you what's behind the doors of the rest of the museum, time permitting.

I think you will find the talk entertaining and I am looking forward to speaking with your group at the November 7th SNAIL General Meeting.
