### **MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIR**



With the arrival of effective vaccines that can protect us from COVID-19, we should have a great opportunity to put this pandemic behind us. Is it to be too hopeful to think we are on the way "back to normal", or unrealistic as we are possibly "expecting too much" from the uncertainty of knowing the impact or efficacy on the world population?

The facts are that these first COVID-19 vaccines may not be perfect, but let's say half of the people receiving them make a protective response strong enough to stop them from transmitting the virus. This will certainly help the efforts to control the virus. But from what science is sharing about their studies, it is clear that at least 70% of the population will need to have a strong and lasting immune response for the SARS-CoV-2, virus to die out altogether.

Science also doesn't know yet, how long a vaccine-induced immune response might last, there are other factors that will make achieving this a challenge.

The sad reality is also that vaccines do not "take" in some people; others cannot be given them due to existing medical conditions and unfortunately, some people will refuse to be vaccinated.

So what's in our future?

All we should really expect from the first vaccines is that they will provide temporary cover to some people.

That, of course, will help a bit, but only as part of a suite of measures.

We will have to keep up with the social distancing and hand hygiene for a while yet. We should also expect masks to be featured in fashion collections up to and until at least autumn/winter 2021, so "they" tell us.

Please continue to be safe; and if you have the opportunity, the will, and the health to do so, get vaccinated.

In honor of Earth Day, on Sunday, April 25<sup>th</sup>, from 1:00-3:00 PM, SNAIL hosted its first outdoors activity, with "Little to No Contact" in compliance with the County Public Health Orange Tier restrictions.

Forty adults and 11 children walked the streets in SNAIL with the intent to collect trash. We looked for any paper items, fast food containers, drinking cups, bottle caps, can pop tabs, plastic lids with straws, cigarette butts, clothing items, or as one of our SNAIL leaders noted, "anything that did not fall from a tree".

- Equipped with a handheld grabber, AKA "pickup and reach tool" for litter removal, and "Do and Don't" Safety Guidelines.
- A map with defined sectors and teams of 1, 2 or 3 people, walked every block and every street in SNAIL, looking for the unwanted trash that paved the sidewalks. SNAIL residents paired by household, looked everywhere for unwanted trash, and collected ~30 bags. Recyclables are estimated at 75 lbs.

At the end of their walk, and after submitting photos of their collection, adult participants received a small, thank-you bag made of recycled material that contained:

- A silicone reusable straw with carrying case, a mini hand sanitizer bottle, a pack of pollinator seeds/bulbs, and a power bar.
- A 15% off coupon to a newly opened Falafel Flame.
- A gift card to either Philz Coffee or Trader Joe's.
- A coupon for a "free" Thai Tea from Pho Lovers.
- A reusable mesh produce bag donated by Patricia Collins.

Participants also received a ticket to a random drawing. Prizes were generously donated by our wonderful sponsors:

- City of Sunnyvale, Environmental Programs
- Falafel Flame on North Mathilda
- Grocery Outlet on North Fair Oaks
- Pho Lovers on Maude
- Renna Shee, Realtor, who donated all gift cards to Philz Coffee and Trader Joe's

This was our first organized outdoor activity since the pandemic, and we did not expect many people to register. We were way off - 40 adults and 11 children responded to the call and, because we reached the limit that the City allowed us, we had to stop accepting volunteers. Registration for this event was closed 3 days prior to the actual activity. As a result of the demand being so great, we are planning to do another Neighborhood Clean Up project again, most likely in the fall of 2021. Well done SNAIL!

### < INNOVATIVE EARTH DAY IDEA 🗨

S.N.A.I.L piloted a second Earth Day idea that complied with the COVID restrictions. A bulk purchase of Special Blend Organic Potting Soil was delivered to a driveway in the heart of the neighborhood. Reusable yellow sandbags of one cubic foot capacity were filled. The soil was made available at cost, including the delivery. Several neighbors and SNAIL members drove by to pick up bags and all have returned their bags. Participants have purchased between one and 40 bags. The creativity of the idea was praised in comments on Nextdoor posts. Sunflower seeds are being given out to children.

This project was not included in the flyer but was promoted in the Newsletter and on Nextdoor. Due to the likelihood of rain on Sunday, additional pickup times were made available on Friday and Saturday. We sold a total of 81 cubic feet of soil to 17 different people, mostly SNAIL residents. We collected \$405; all our bags were or will be returned so we can reuse them next year. *-Jenny Purushotma, SNAIL Earth Day Team*

Families drive through the CNC/CMS parking lot and volunteers load about 100 pounds of food (dry, can and fresh food) into each car with no contact. The next distribution is scheduled for *Wednesday, May 26<sup>th</sup>, 3:20 - 4:10 p.m.*
